Our classmate, <u>Dr. John P. Gelsomino</u>, passed away on June 14 of an apparent heart attack. John received a Bachelor's degree in music from DePaul University and a Master's in education. He joined the staff at Kelly High School in 1965 as a music teacher and band director. He left in 1972 to become assistant principal at Curie High School. He returned to Kelly and was principal from 1990 to 2001. In 2000, a new performing arts building at the school was named in his honor, family members said. While in charge at Kelly, the former Army intelligence officer once drove gang members out of the school, chasing them down an alley and ripping his pant leg in the process, his family said. "The great thing was that they never returned because they thought John was nuts," said his wife. "He sometimes had that effect on people." In retirement, Dr. Gelsomino was a musical director at Fenwick. He also conducted the annual 4th of July concert at the Chicago Historical Society and was in the River Forest Community Band. MUSIC MEMORIES: THE ONE HIT WONDERS OF THE FIFTIES (by Chuck Meyer):

Last quarter's mystery singer was Grace Kelly, who sang in the 1956 movie "High Society". This was a musical remake of the earlier "Philadelphia Story", with music by Cole Porter. Grace sang a duet with co-star Bing Crosby; This was her first recording. "True Love" was the name of the song and of the yacht they were on. Frank Sinatra was a member of the cast, and he also sang a duet with der Bingle. Grace was a well-respected film actress, but after this movie, she married Prince Rainier of Monaco and made no further movies. She soon presented Prince Rainier with a male heir, which ensured the continuing independence of Monaco. (Monaco and France have an agreement that Monaco stays independent as long as there is a male heir to the throne. After that, Monaco reverts to French control). She did, however, make one other recording - in 1980 - entitled "Birds, Beasts & Flowers: A Programme of Poetry, Prose, and Music". "When you guys were graduating from high school, I was a mere 11 years old, but I had already achieved fame in England as a boy singer, recording in both English and German. In 1957, I recorded an up-tempo gospel song that became a big hit both in England and the U.S. In the U.S., it was number one for four weeks. To this day, it remains the only gospel song to reach #1 on a U.S. pop singles chart. A few other singers recorded this song, but none was ever a significant challenge to me.

"In the early 1960's I recorded two more songs, but they were never even noticed. After that, I gave up on the music industry. By 1990, I began keeping my hands busy running a hotel in my world in northern England, and I now reside in London. Who am I, and what was my song?"

MOVES, TRAVELS & NOTES:

Mike and Nancy (Baggio) Pasquerelli had a cross-country auto adventure in June. Here are excerpts from Mike's travelogue. "On June 2, we left for Yosemite National Park. We stayed in a cabin in the Park for four days. I took pictures, while Nancy climbed Vernal Falls with two friends. After much hiking and sight-seeing in beautiful Yosemite, we travelled to San Marcos, CA to stay with friends and visit Nancy's uncle. We also went to La Jolla for a day of sunshine and many more photos of the beautiful California coast. We then headed for the Grand Canyon. I stopped the car half way to the Grand Canyon, spotting airplanes! It was the "Planes of Fame Museum of the Grand Canyon!" There were planes that I had my hands on at one time or another. We checked in at the "Red Feather Hotel," one mile from the Park entrance, then went to the Park. The sky was overcast, which wasn't great for photographs, but my new "ExpoDisc" did well, setting the white balance on my Nikons, so we shot many photos anyway! The Grand Canyon is FABULOUS and the National Park Service is still EXCELLENT! Very thorough, efficient, friendly workers and Rangers! There is a shuttle bus service in Yosemite and Grand Canyon Park. You park your car and take the bus. They run every 15 minutes so you can get off and on to see the sights. Tuesday was an exhausting day. We had a great steak at the "Yippee-ei-o Steakhouse". We also went to the IMAX "Grand Canyon Movie." We learned from a Ranger that the "Skywalk" is outside of the Park. It is on an Indian reservation near the California and Nevada borders; cost is about \$85.00. We didn't go. The next day, we were going to leave because it was raining, but Nancy wanted to go back to get her Park Service Passport stamped. Then, we saw holes in the clouds. Blue Sky! We changed our plans on the spot! Nancy called back to the "Red Feather" and booked us back for the night. We had some sun, so got some great photos of the Colorado River and the Rapids. On Thursday, June 18, we departed for "Canyon De Chelly" (de-shay), then either Santa Fe, NM or "Four Corners" and Colorado. We've travelled over 3300 miles so far. We drove through a Navajo Reservation which was mostly desert on U.S. 160. Some interesting "Road Construction Novelties" included driving on the base underlayment. The road crews were rebuilding from "the ground up." The U.S. Highways are excellent. We stopped at one of the Navajo roadside jewelry & pottery sales. Part of it was a viewpoint of the dry "Little Colorado River" Canyon. Next, was a stop at "Four Corners". We took pictures and videos of each other with hands and feet in all four States! Geography lesson: Guess the States!



Saturday, June 20, we headed east on U.S. 160 through the San Juan Mountains to the east slope of the Rockies. We arrived home on Monday, June 22, after 5200 miles of driving. We were exhausted, happy to have seen so much of our beautiful USA. I hope all the photos and videos turn out well.


