News About the New Austin High School

Title: <u>Business Academy Looks Ahead to '06</u> Former State Supt. Bakalis Heads Consortium Behind New School

Austin High School's 2006 senior class was the last class of Austin High School as we know it. The new school hoped to have its new class in place by the summer of 2006 and in accordance with the Chicago Renaissance 2010 plan.

The Austin Business and Entrepreneurship Academy will open its 2006-2007 school year at the Austin High School campus on Pine Street, with a total of 200 freshmen, said Michael Bakalis, CEO of American Quality Schools. American Quality Schools has charter schools in Chicago and Indiana.

Bakalis, an Austin graduate of the 1955 class claimed, "We're recruiting and marketing for students." Bakalis is a former state superintendent of schools, former president of Triton College in River Grove, and previously ran for governor of Illinois.

Under Mayor Daley's Renaissance 2010 school restructuring plan, Austin High School stopped accepting freshman in 2003. The plan was to close underperforming schools and reopen them as a cluster of smaller schools.

The Business and Entrepreneur Academy is one of three schools planned for the Austin Campus. Two additional schools will be chosen for Austin by 2007.

Bakalis said new faculty are currently being interviewed for the business school. Funding for the Academy will come from the city on a per-pupil basis. Bakalis said the business school expects to have a first year total enrollment of 200 freshmen. A new class will be added each year. Under Renaissance 2010 guidelines, new schools cannot accept more than 200 freshmen its first year.

Bakalis also said the new school has a proposal to Chicago Public Schools to organize several advisory committees for groups such as parents, faculty, students and local business leaders. He also emphasized, "We want broad community involvement."

A number of West Side schools have closed or are slated to close and reopen as small schools. West Side aldermen and community activists have tried to call a halt to school closings and want a study done on the impact the school closings are having on students. Critics have cited an increase in violence at schools accepting students from consolidated schools. On March 13, 2006, Austin parents and activists held a protest and prayer vigil outside Austin High School concerning violence associated with the school closings.

<u>Update: Austin Business Academy Opens</u> Excerpt from: Austin Weekly News by Terry Dean, August 30, 2006

The Austin Business and Entrepreneurship Academy (ABEA) officially opened during the last week in August 2006 in the former Austin High School building at 231 N. Pine. There are 250 students in the freshman class. The academy is the first of three schools slated for this site. Two additional small schools will be chosen by Chicago Public Schools CEO Arne Duncan. They are scheduled to open in 2007 and 2008. (Austin High School's last senior class from the old school will graduate in 2007.)

The Austin Business Academy is one of 100 schools expected to open at converted school buildings under the Renaissance 2010 (Ren 2010) school restructuring plan

American Quality Schools (AQS), the Westside Ministers Coalition, and the Allstate Corporation, also a major financial backer, are partnering the new school.

Michael Bakalis, president and CEO of AQS said, "It's a really important thing for me. I grew up in Austin, I went to this school, I worked four years here, and I graduated from this school. This is a very important thing to get this off the ground."

Allstate gave a check for \$500,000, as part of the Renaissance Schools Fund. The school will also receive partial funding from Chicago Public Schools on a per pupil basis.

The school will start with 15 teachers this fall and 23 students per class. The curriculum will include the basics, but the focus is on preparing students to become business owners and community leaders. "The school will prepare kids to go to college if that's what they want to do-it is a college curriculum-but our goal is to get some of these kids to start thinking about opening their own businesses, and staying in the Austin community," Bakalis said. "That's what we want to do, help revitalize businesses in the Austin community."

The school will use Wednesdays for workshops, seminars, field trips, etc. Regular classes will take place the rest of the week. The school will place students as interns with area businesses.

"We want to be hands on," said Ade Onayemi, CEO of Urban Resources Inc. and member of the Austin African American Business Networking Assn. (AAABNA), one of the community partners of the school.

The Austin school campus received a \$3 million renovation, including new lockers, desks, and chairs. More than half of REN2010 schools serve black students. Black and Latino students make up the majority of students attending Ren 2010 charter schools.

"Austin is not closing," said Malcolm Crawford, executive director of the AAABNA, and director of communications for the Business Academy. "We have programs for the kids to help them become successful in life and business."
