AUSTIN NEWS:

According to the latest *Building Usage Report* issued on January 2, 2020, by the Chicago Board of Education, the majority of Chicago Public Schools' district-run elementary and high schools are not being properly utilized. Nearly 290 schools across the city are considered either *overcrowded* or *underutilized* based on space availability and student enrollment. Among the CPS school buildings, 253 are *underutilized*, meaning they use less than 70% of their ideal enrollment capacity. Thirty-five schools were classified as *overcrowded* – meaning they use more than 110% of their ideal capacity – while another 206 schools were deemed *efficient*. These figures include only district-run schools, so charter and alternative schools are not factored in. The Austin College and Career Academy High School, with an October 1, 2019, enrollment of 245 in a building equipped to handle 1,908, has a utilization rate of 13%, and is classified as *underutilized*. MILESTONES & HISTORIC EVENTS:

100 years of Good Humor: In 1919, Christian Nelson, an Iowa store owner, discovered how to coat an ice cream bar with chocolate, inventing the Eskimo Pie. When he heard of the discovery, Harry Burt (1875–1926), owner of a Youngstown, Ohio, ice cream parlor, replicated Nelson's product. The story is that Burt's 23-year-old daughter Ruth thought that the new novelty was too messy. Burt's son, Harry Jr, suggested using a wooden stick as a convenient handle. They tried out the idea in the store's hardening room, where they discovered that the stick formed a strong bond when the ice cream crystallized. Burt outfitted twelve street vending trucks in Youngstown with rudimentary freezers and bells to sell his "Good Humor Ice Cream Suckers" in 1920.

<u>100 years ago</u>, on January 19, 1920, the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) was founded by Roger Baldwin, Helen Keller, and others. The ACLU states as its mission the protection and preservation of First Amendment rights, equal protection under the law, due process, and the right to privacy.

<u>75 years ago:</u> on January 27, 1945, the Auschwitz death camp in Poland was liberated by Russian soldiers. They could not believe what they saw there. "Do not be indifferent when any minority suffers discrimination," warned Auschwitz survivor Marian Turski, 93. [*Time* 2-10-20] Editor note: NEVER FORGET! <u>60 years ago</u>: in 1960, Pizza Hut was born. In 1958, just three years after the McDonald's franchise was established, two brothers in Wichita, Kansas, named Dan and Frank Carney had an idea. They asked their mother to <u>loan</u> them \$600 so they could open a pizza shop in a downtown building that was shaped a bit like a hut. They could only fit nine letters on the sign out front, so, playing off the odd shape of the building, the Carney brothers named their restaurant Pizza Hut. Two years later, the first Pizza Hut franchise opened. The pizza chain grew from there. Rival pizza chain Domino's started in the early 1960s and Papa John's didn't enter the market until 1984. Today, Pizza Hut is the largest user of cheese in the world. [*The Daily Meal*, September 27, 2019]

A FOOTNOTE OF SORTS:

Charles Brannock grew up around shoes at his father's shoe store in Syracuse, NY. As at most other shoe stores at the time, shoe sizes were measured using a block of wood. In the 1920s, while at college, Brannock set out to find a more accurate way to measure feet. He experimented using his childhood erector set and was eventually able to secure patents in 1926 and 1927. The **Brannock Device** could simultaneously measure foot length, foot width, and the distance between the heel and the ball of the foot, showing the location of the arch. It determined foot size with 95 percent accuracy and could detect irregular sizes that past ways of measurement could not. Brannock used the device at his father's store, and soon, footwear companies began ordering it for use in other stores. During World War II, the Army even hired Brannock to create a special device for measuring soldiers' feet for Army boots. Brannock supplied his devices all over the world from his factory headquarters in Syracuse. The Brannock device, which has changed little over the years, became ubiquitous in shoe stores and remains so today. [Lemelson Center for the Study of Invention and Innovation - January 15, 2020]

SPECIAL DAYS (WHO KNEW?):

March 30 is National Doctors' Day, an annual observance of the first anniversary of a doctor using ether anesthesia, by Dr. Crawford W. Long. The holiday first started in 1933 in Winder, Georgia, and since then, every year on March 30, we continue to celebrate medical advances like these and thank all doctors everywhere.

March 25 is Waffle Day. It is a tradition that is celebrated in Sweden, Norway, and to a lesser extent elsewhere. March 25 is also the Feast of the Annunciation, upon which waffles are typically eaten. The shift from the religious celebration to Waffle Day occurred because the Swedish *Vårfrudagen*, meaning "Our Lady's Day" (the Feast of the Annunciation), sounds similar to *Våffeldagen* ("waffle day") in faster speech, and so over time, Swedes began calling it Waffle Day and celebrating it by eating waffles.

DID YOU KNOW?

The biggest toy company also happens to make the smallest pieces. According to World Atlas, the Lego Group, which is based in Billund, Denmark, is the world's largest toy manufacturer. Not only have Legos been a staple of childhood memories worldwide, but they've also spawned tons of different build sets, theme parks, art projects, museums, and even some top-grossing movies.
