1954 MUSIC; A REFRESHER -- "If You Love Me (Really Love Me)":

<u>Chuck Meyer</u>, while commuting recently (that <u>is</u> as ugly as it sounds), was listening to jazz radio and heard a new, jazz (non-vocal) arrangement of "If You Love Me (Really Love Me)". He remembered it from high school but had not heard it since then (not even on any of those "Nifty Fifties" music CDs). He even remembered some of the words! So he tracked it down, and found this information (and three different recordings of it!) on WikiPedia, plus other websites. Maybe you'll remember and enjoy!

The cast of characters for this story includes the foremost female singer of France, Edith Piaf, the foremost female singer of England, Vera Lynn, and an American songstress, Kay Starr. The English-speaking singers are still alive. "Hymne à L'Amour" ("Hymn to Love" fr.) is a popular French song originally written by Édith Piaf, and recorded by her on 2 May 1950. The music was by Marguerite Monnot. Piaf apparently wrote the song as a tribute to the man she considered the love of her life; French boxer Marcel Cerdan, who died in a plane crash in 1949. The song was then translated into English as "If You Love Me (Really Love Me)". In 1952, England's Vera Lynn recorded it, but it didn't go anywhere. Then Kay Starr recorded it in 1954, and both versions made it into Billboard's Top 40 in April, 1954. Altho' Chuck has always enjoyed Vera Lynn's singing, it was Kay Starr's husky voice he remembers best doing "If you Love Me..." The song never made it to #1. Vera Lynn also recorded "Auf Weiderseh'n Sweetheart" in 1952, and that was the first time a non-US singer got into the Top 40. Chuck still has her 78 RPM recording of that song! The Edith Piaf posting on YouTube was done by a Brazilian who translated the French lyrics into Portuguese, and then into bizarre English. Luckily, Vera Lynn and Kay Starr used the following translation by (E.Piaf / G.Parsons / M.Monnot):

If the sun should tumble from the sky, If the sea should suddenly run dry, If you love me, really love me, Let it happen, I won't care, If it seems that ev'ry thing is lost, I will smile and never count the cost, If you love me, really love me, Let it happen, darling I won't care, Shall I catch a shooting star? Shall I bring it where you are? If you want me to, I will. You can set me any task, I'll do anything you ask, If you'll only say you love me still, When at last our life on earth is through I will share eternity with you, If you love me, really love me, Let it happen, I won't care, If you love me, really love me, Let it happen, darling, I won't care

CHICAGO NOSTALGIA:

Oscar Mayer started 125 years ago this past February. In 1883, Oscar Mayer and his brother Gottfried leased the Kolling Meat Market. The two sold bratwurst, liverwurst and weißwurst and were popular in the predominantly German neighborhood around the market. Now, Oscar Mayer it is one of Kraft's seven \$1 billion brands. The Buffalo Ice Cream Parlor was the place to go for ice cream treats on the Northwest Side. Although the original parlor at Irving Park and Pulaski closed in 1978, you can still enjoy the delicious Buffalo creations at the restaurant and ice cream parlor located at the corner of Arlington Heights Road. and Lake-Cook Road in Buffalo Grove.

The World's Columbian Exposition of 1893 introduced Chicago to: Aunt Jemima Syrup, Cracker Jacks, Cream of Wheat, Diet carbonated soda, Juicy Fruit gum, Pabst Beer, Shredded Wheat and the Hamburger.

Olson Rug Company was established in 1874. The manufacturing mill was located in Chicago at Diversey Ave. and Pulaski Road. During the War era, when raw material was scarce, people would send in their old wool rugs, rags, clothing, etc. and Olson would turn them into beautiful area rugs. The family-owned business was "the place" to buy rugs for many years. Alongside the factory was the renowned Olson Memorial Park. Walter E. Olson built the 22 acre park in 1935. The project took nearly six months to complete. About 800 tons of stone and 800 yards of soil were used for its construction. Approximately 3,500 perennials were planted, along with numerous species of junipers, spruces, pines, arbor-vitaes and annuals. The park consisted of a stunning rock garden, duck pond and a 35-foot waterfall, which was a replica of one at Mr. Olson's Wisconsin vacation home. Olson Park became a popular spot for family outings and was open for free to the public. During the first Sunday after its dedication, Olson Park attracted as many as 600 visitors per hour. Several times during the summer, Olson brought in Indians from Wisconsin to perform tribal ceremonies and dances. I remember going to the park to climb the falls several times a year, and always for the Injun Summer display. Because the area around Pulaski and Diversey was heavily populated by Polish families, the Olson Falls became known as the Polish Dells. In one of the patient lounge areas funded by the Olson family in Lutheran General Hospital in Park Ridge, there was (maybe still is?) a tapestry of the original waterfall with a plaque explaining the connection. In 1965, Olson Rug sold its building to Marshall Field's. In the 1970's, the waterfall was turned off and the park dismantled to make room for a parking lot.
