## OSHER LIFELONG LEARNING INSTITUTE:

Chuck Meyer writes: Are you in OLLI? Do you know about OLLI? OLLI is Osher Lifelong Learning Institute, a senior learning program connected to a university. There are 118 in the country.

The Bernard Osher Foundation, created by Bernard Osher, has the goal of supporting education and the arts. One of the most important programs is a national network of lifelong learning for older adults. He was interested in meeting the needs of older learners who want to learn simply for the joy of learning and personal fulfillment. Classes are taught by retired professors, knowledgeable people and sometimes graduate students, all on a volunteer basis. The best part is that there are no tests! A small sampling of subject matter includes art, books, computers, history, psychology, science, and preparation for travel to destinations both in the US and abroad. In the Twin Cities there are also special interest groups such as theater, ethnic dining, biking, Scrabble, Bridge and many more.

The specific models of each group vary widely, but the premise for all OLLI groups is the same. In the Twin Cities, there are more than 250 courses over four sessions each year. The membership is over 1,000 . At some locations, the classes are held at a university; in the Twin Cities, classes are held around the metro area in churches, community rooms, nursing homes, or wherever space is donated.
