**Celebrating 30 years of Designated Driver.** In 1986, Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) introduced the country to a new concept and phrase – the designated driver- to describe the role a non-drinking driver plays in ensuring everyone gets home safely after a celebration or event with alcohol. The Nuremberg Trials of Major War Criminals ended 70 years ago on October 1, 1946.

Mount Rushmore turns 75. South Dakota historian Doane Robinson is credited with conceiving the idea of carving the likenesses of famous people into the Black Hills region of South Dakota in order to promote tourism in the region. Sculptor Gutzon Borglum rejected the original Needles site because of the poor quality of the granite and strong opposition from Native American groups. They settled on the Mount Rushmore location, which also has the advantage of facing southeast for maximum sun exposure. Robinson wanted it to feature western heroes like Lewis and Clark, Red Cloud, [5] and Buffalo Bill Cody, [6] but Borglum decided the sculpture should have a more national focus and chose the four presidents. Construction began in 1927, and the presidents' faces were completed between 1934 and 1939. Upon Gutzon Borglum's death in March 1941, his son Lincoln Borglum took over construction. Although the initial concept called for each president to be depicted from head to waist, lack of funding forced construction to end in late October 1941. [8] Between October 4, 1927, and October 31, 1941, Gutzon Borglum and 400 workers [16] sculpted the colossal 60 foot (18 m) high carvings of U.S. presidents G. Washington, T. Jefferson, T. Roosevelt, and A. Lincoln to represent the first 130 years of American history. These presidents were selected by Borglum because of their role in preserving the Republic and expanding its territory. [14][17] Thomas Jefferson was originally intended to appear at Washington's right, but after the work there was begun, the rock was found to be unsuitable, so a new figure was sculpted to Washington's left.[14]

Walt Disney's fourth animated film, and the first set in America, *Dumbo*, was released **75 years ago** on October 23, 1941. The loveable baby circus elephant was ridiculed for his enormous ears – but assisted by true friend Timothy, the tiny mouse, Dumbo eventually discovered he could use them to fly! In the original story, *Dumbo the Flying Elephant*, Dumbo's sidekick was a bird, not a mouse. The line in the movie, "Lots of people with big ears are famous," was a reference to **Clark Gable**. ## FIRE DESTROYS HISTORIC WILLOWBROOK BALLROOM:

The nearly century-old Willowbrook Ballroom, a legendary dance hall and a scene for one of the Chicago area's most enduring ghost stories\*, was gutted by fire on Friday, October 28. This August, the ballroom marked its **90th birthday**.

"The loss of this historical building is a loss to the community," said Willow Springs Fire Chief Daniel Niemeyer. "A thorough investigation of the cause of this fire has begun and will be ongoing."

This is the second time the ballroom was destroyed at the same location. The building was rebuilt after a fire in 1930 and it still hosted dances with live orchestras. Founded in 1921 by John Verderbar as an outdoor dance hall known as Oh Henry Park, the establishment came to grow and flourish through the 1920's, until 1930, when disaster struck and the complex burned to ground-level ruins. Out of the ashes rose the Oh Henry Ballroom, built at the then staggering cost of \$100,000. The 1930's and 40's found hundreds of thousands in the mood to swing, as the ballroom became home to the biggest and best bands of the day, complete with its own restaurant, soda fountain and flower shop.

\* The Resurrection Mary story goes that Mary had spent the evening dancing with a boyfriend at the Oh Henry Ballroom. At some point, they got into an argument and Mary stormed out. Even though it was a cold winter's night, she thought she would rather face a cold walk home than spend another minute with her boyfriend. She left the ballroom and started walking up Archer Avenue. She had not gotten very far when she was struck and killed by a hit-and-run driver, who fled the scene leaving Mary to die. Her parents found her and were grief-stricken. They buried her in Resurrection Cemetery, wearing a beautiful white dancing dress and matching dancing shoes. The hit-and-run driver was never found.

Jerry Palus, a Chicago southsider, reported that in 1939 he met a person who he came to believe was Resurrection Mary at the Liberty Grove and Hall at 47th and Mozart (and *not* the Oh Henry/Willowbrook Ballroom). They danced and even kissed and she asked him to drive her home along Archer Avenue, exiting the car and disappearing in front of Resurrection Cemetery.<sup>[4]</sup>

In 1973, Resurrection Mary was said to have shown up at Harlow's nightclub, on Cicero Avenue on Chicago's southwest side. [5] That same year, a cab driver came into Chet's Melody Lounge, across the street from Resurrection Cemetery, to inquire about a young lady who had left without paying her fare. [6]

There were said to be sightings in 1976, 1978, 1980, and 1989, which involved cars striking, or nearly striking, Mary outside Resurrection Cemetery. [7] Mary disappears, however, by the time the motorist exits the car. [Wikipedia]

# Happy 130th Birthday Lady Liberty!

#### WHAT IS ROTC?

In response to this question asked at our 60-year Reunion last September, classmate **Paul Sengpiehl** writes: "The official definition is Reserve Officers' Training Corps. During our years at Austin High, many schools in Chicago had a ROTC program. At Austin, all male students had an option – 'Gym' or 'ROTC'."

The ROTC class and activities were like Basic Training in the U.S. Army. There was a competition among Chicago High School ROTC programs in precision marching drill and rifle marksmanship. Every year, there was a formal Military Dress Review of all Austin ROTC Cadets at Merrick Park. At the beginning of every Student Assembly in the Auditorium, the ROTC Honor Guard formally presented the U.S. and Illinois flags. Our Commencement Ceremony included that same formal presentation by the ROTC. Honor Guard. The highest-ranking officer in the Austin ROTC was a Lt. Colonel. John Fascia, Jan. '55 graduate, was our Lt. Colonel during his senior year. Then, Ed Handzel from the June '55 class became Lt. Colonel, Don Knuth was Major, and Paul Sengpiehl was Captain. At the end of our Austin ROTC years of service and graduation, many of our ROTC Cadets were offered an honorary position appointment to the Illinois National Guard. John Fascia accepted this appointment, and worked his way up the ranks to become Brigadier General in the Illinois National Guard. The Illinois National Guard is the official Illinois State Military and is under the Governor's authority. It is used for State emergency purposes and was sometimes also used in national war efforts.

The ROTC program provided an important beginning of identity with our country to our young men at that time. It also started our appreciation for the military men and women who served our country and gave their lives for our independence and freedom."

#### **BEWARE OF PHONY IRS SCAMS:**

*Irwin Magad* reminds us the IRS has announced that there is a new scam. From the *Wall Street Journal* article on October 1, the taxpayer would receive in the mail or via email, a form CP-2000. The form will request payment to the IRS service center in Austin Texas. (FYI - The IRS <u>does</u> have a large center there). It requires payment to an IRS Post Office Box, but this P.O. Box is not controlled by the IRS. It also requires that checks be written to the IRS and not the Department of the Treasury. Be VERY careful when reviewing IRS notices. The IRS advises taxpayers to first call the IRS before paying a bill (ha-ha if you ever get to talk to anyone). The IRS says that the notices look real and millions of people have received them. Also, **under no circumstances**, respond to a phone call that purports to be from the IRS. They DO NOT call. It's a scam!
