<u>AUSTIN IN THE NEWS:</u> On Friday, October 5<sup>th</sup>, Cook County Board President Toni Preckwinkle met with students enrolled in Austin College & Career Academy's manufacturing program to celebrate National Manufacturing Day. The national day showcases modern manufacturing and serves to inspire the next generation of manufacturers. Ms. Preckwinkle says, "Jobs are lifesavers, and my hope is that young people in Chicago contemplate their career options and seriously consider manufacturing."

The program at Austin College & Career Academy is operated by Manufacturing Renaissance's Manufacturing Connect (MC) program, which also operates programs at two other Chicago Public Schools. Austin College & Career Academy is only one of three high schools in Illinois accredited by the National Institute for Metalworking Skills (NIMS). This nationally recognized program provides young adults with career pathways into manufacturing through paid work experiences, training for industry credentials, career and college counseling, opportunities for dual-credit, mentoring and leadership development. MC has facilitated 514 work experiences for program participants, raised more than \$6 million to support advanced manufacturing education and engaged over 105 companies in its work.

Cook County provides grant funding to Manufacturing Renaissance for their groundbreaking work preparing youth with the skills required for today's well-paying jobs in manufacturing. In 2017, the average manufacturing worker in the United States earned \$84,832 annually, including benefits. Each year, the **Open House Chicago** weekend offers architecture buffs a look inside some of the city's best buildings. The annual event, put on by the Chicago Architecture Center, started in 2011. No structures in **Austin** were ever on the list until this year, when 11 buildings in the West Side neighborhood joined hundreds across the city in opening their doors on October 13-14. We regret we cannot include photos of these unique buildings, due to space restrictions, but you can see them at <u>https://chicago.suntimes.com/entertainment/openhouse-chicago-national-bank-austin-architecture-catholic-charities/</u> if you subscribe to the Chicago Sun-Times. One of those hidden gems on display is the Father August Tolton Peace Center, 5645 W. Corcoran Pl., operated by Catholic Charities of Chicago. The center is in a former bank building, complete with a still-functioning vault that dates to 1913. When the Austin Bank of Chicago, originally the National Bank of Austin, closed in 2017, the property was transferred to Catholic Charities "instead of seeing the building go to ruin or sit there vacant," said Eric Rogers, manager of Open House Chicago. "So now it has turned into this hub for the community." The center offers parenting classes, employment programs and violence prevention services, among other assistance.

"The center has made few changes to the original structure, so visitors are reminded of the rich history of the bank at every turn," Richardson said. Initially designed by Frederick R. Schock, the bank was built in three stages over 50 years. Schock, a prolific architect in the Austin neighborhood, also is responsible for many Victorian-style homes in the area, as well as a firehouse at 439 N. Waller Ave., according to the Chicago Architecture Center.

Other Austin structures on the Open House list include Austin Town Hall, 5610 W. Lake St., about a block north of the bank building, on the other side of the Green Line tracks; and Assumption Greek Orthodox Church, 601 S. Central Ave., about a mile to the south, close to the Eisenhower Expressway.

## **MORE AUSTIN NEWS:**

Austin College and Career Academy High School, 231 N. Pine Ave., recently received needed improvements to their weight room, dance studio, locker rooms, and courtyard with the help of student volunteers, volunteers from the local United Healthcare chapter, and the Team8 Tour.

The Team8 Tour is a national campaign that encourages young people across the country to make healthy choices, build character and learn critical life lessons to inspire them to be catalysts for positive social change. The initiative is led by the Cal Ripken, Sr. Foundation, UnitedHealthcare, and CBS EcoMedia and will travel to eight cities, including Chicago, across the country to engage volunteers in support of high schools and local community centers. Volunteers from UnitedHealthcare and Austin College and Career Academy worked together on projects that ultimately will make it easier for students to live healthier and more active lifestyles. The projects included upgrading and organizing fitness spaces and assembling new fitness equipment for those spaces, cleaning up the outdoor garden, and updating the dance studio which will serve as a quiet space for students and faculty to practice meditation, yoga, and Pilates.

Austin College and Career Academy is currently a level two high school requiring intensive support, according to Chicago Public Schools (CPS). Of the 217 students enrolled, CPS reports show that 76.3 percent are chronically truant. The newly upgraded fitness spaces have a potential to not only encourage healthy lifestyles through enhanced athletic programs but also inspire kids to get excited about coming to school with the appeal of fresh fitness spaces.

"Knowing that Austin College and Career Academy serves as a community center for students from early morning until late evening, we were thrilled to hear the reaction from Principal Reynolds that our volunteer effort will help kids feel welcome all the time. The Austin College and Career Academy students and teachers could not have been more appreciative and that was the best part for our UnitedHealthcare team," said Colleen Van Ham, president and CEO of UnitedHealthcare of Illinois.

## **MILESTONES**:

**Illinois Bi-Centennial**: For the first time ever, all five championship trophies won by Chicago pro sports teams will appear together as part of the state's Bicentennial Birthday Party on **December 3rd** at the United Center. The trophies will be featured at the culmination of an Illinois champions parade of team owners, players, legends and celebrity fans. The Bears, Blackhawks, Bulls, Cubs and White Sox will be joined by representatives of the original Rockford Peaches who are being recognized on the 75th anniversary of their first All-American Girls Professional Baseball League championship. Track and field star Jackie Joyner-Kersee will lead a cavalcade of Illinois Olympic champions.

The Bicentennial Birthday program will be a star-studded affair that will highlight the people, places, events and innovations that were born, built and grown in Illinois. Tickets ranging from \$50-\$75 are on sale through Ticketmaster and at the United Center box office. For information go to www.illinois200.com. Among the most anticipated acts is a tribute to the state's greatest citizen, Abraham Lincoln, that includes a special musical rendition of the Gettysburg Address starring Miguel Cervantes, who plays Alexander Hamilton in the Chicago cast of "Hamilton."

<u>**THIS & THAT:**</u> Daylight Saving Time (DST): **Arizona and Hawaii are now the only states that don't observe daylight savings time.** Before 2006, most of Indiana did not observe <u>DST</u>, but some counties used <u>DST</u>, which caused great confusion. To rectify this, Indiana passed a bill in 2005 ensuring the entire state would use DST.

**125 years ago**, in September 1893, the State of Illinois granted a charter for a new museum in Chicago. The institution's purpose: "the accumulation and dissemination of knowledge and the preservation and exhibition of artifacts illustrating art, archaeology, science, and history." Hence, the Columbian Museum of Chicago was born and opened its doors on **December 8, 1893**. Today, we call it the **Field Museum**. The building is now a Chicago landmark. Also, in 1893, The Vienna Beef hot dog made its debut at the World's Fair.

**100 years ago, on July 3<sup>rd</sup>, 1818**, the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, America's most important bird protection law, went into effect. Throughout 2018, we are celebrating this milestone as the <u>Year of the Bird.</u>

Aug. 25, 2018 marks the centennial of Leonard Bernstein's birth. He was a singular American talent and one of the great orchestra conductors of his generation. He was also a composer of symphonies, ballets and hit musicals, a teacher, a television personality and a complicated man with a complicated personal life.

**On August 26, 1818**, the **first Illinois Constitution** was adopted: Illinois government is modeled after the Federal government and the U.S. Constitution. To be admitted into the Union, Illinois had to adopt its own constitution. The first Illinois Constitution was written in the summer of 1818 in Kaskaskia. It created three branches of government, just like the U.S. Constitution--legislative, executive, and judicial. It also set up the boundaries for the State and named Kaskaskia as the capital. From 1818 until 1848, Illinois went through a time of rapid growth and development. In response, a *second* constitution was written and adopted in 1848. The Constitution of 1848 gave greater responsibilities to the executive and judicial branches. It also put restrictions on the legislative branch. A *third* Illinois Constitution was adopted in 1870. The 1870 Constitution again expanded the powers of the executive and judicial branches. The 1870 Constitution remained in force for 100 years. Illinois adopted its fourth (and current) Constitution on December 15, 1970.

**100 years ago**, on **November 11, 1918**, World War 1 (The Great War) ended. In the United States, we recognize Veteran's Day (formerly Armistice Day) with various ceremonies and exhibits. In the Chicago area, we have many statues and other tributes in memory of those who fought and died in the Great War, among them the Winnetka Cenotaph Memorial, the Victory Monument in Bronzeville, the Wheaton WWI Obelisk, the Doughboy Statue in Morton Grove, and the First Division Museum at Cantigny Park in Winfield. [The best theory for why American soldiers were nicknamed "doughboys": Dusty Texas land settled on American infantrymen's uniforms during the Mexican War, giving them the appearance of being covered in flour, and the nickname stuck.] A project to repair and protect the WWI statues, called 100 Cities/100 Memorials, provides matching grants of up to \$2,000 for the restoration and upkeep of WWI memorials. The project is a partnership of Chicago's Pritzker Military Museum & Library and the United States WWI Centennial Commission, with support from the American Legion and VFW. The Elks National Memorial, in Lincoln Park, was dedicated in 1926 to the 70,000 Elks who served in World War I. It's a splendid building, both inside and out.

On **November 18, 2018**, Mickey Mouse turns **90**. With a milestone as big as 90 years, one party simply will not do! That's why Mickey's birthday celebration will span across the globe with a series of events at all Disney Parks sites around the world, including the World's Biggest Mouse Party – a limited-time, global celebration of Mickey and Minnie – as well as '*Mickey: The True Original Exhibition*' in New York City.

**85 years ago**, on **July 6, 1933**, Major League's first official All-Star Game was held at Comiskey Park as part of Chicago's 1933 World's Fair. Babe Ruth's two-run homer highlighted the American League's 4–2 victory. [Chicago Sun-Times]

**85 years ago**, on **February 20, 1933**, the 21<sup>st</sup> amendment to the Constitution was passed by Congress and was ratified on **December 5, 1933**. The 21st Amendment repealed the 18th Amendment of **January 16, 1919**, ending the increasingly unpopular nationwide prohibition of alcohol.

**80 years ago, Superman** was "born." Superman's official 'birthday' is **April 18, 1938**, the day the first issue of Action Comics #1 was released. The character's fictional birthday is celebrated on February 29 during leap years. There's also Superman Day on June 12, reserved by DC Comics to recognize and celebrate Superman's legacy.

**80 years ago, on October 18, 1938,** the beef began in Chicago's Little Italy neighborhood. Al Ferrari, his sister Frances and brother-in-law Chris Pacelli, Sr., developed the first Italian beef recipe in Al's home kitchen during the Great Depression. Meat was hard to come by during the Depression, so Al and Chris would slice the meat very thin and place it on loaves of bread in order to make the most of what they had. The family eventually opened its original storefront at 1079 W. Taylor St. and expanded the menu to include Italian and Polish sausages, hot dogs and fries. The City of Chicago declared Oct. 18, 2018 "Al's Beef Day" in honor of the anniversary, and Italian beef fans lined up at Al's Beef for 80-cent sandwiches all day.

**70 years ago**, the ABC television network debuted on **April 19, 1948**, with WFIL-TV in Philadelphia. The first program ever broadcast was *On the Corner*, featuring satirist Henry Morgan. Experimental Television (TV) station W9XBK began in the fall of 1939, as the first in Chicago and the third in America. The station telecast a 15 minutes per day program consisting of a newscast and a film short. Often, instead of a test pattern, a camera was aimed at the Wrigley Building and the Chicago River. In August 1943, W9XBK obtained an FCC license and a permit for a commercial TV station. Two months later, on October 13, 1943, newly titled WBKB-TV debuted on Ch.4. **In 1948**, ABC-owned station, WENR-TV/Ch.7, signed on in Chicago. [ABC Chicago Archive]

[Many significant events occurred 50 years ago in 1968, some good, some bad. We'll just list the good.]

**On September 8, 2018, Ralph Lauren celebrated 50 years of his company** with a gala dinner in Central Park. For any American company, 50 years is something to celebrate. For a fashion company, it's remarkable, particularly because Lauren remains at the helm. Ralph, born Ralph Lifshitz to Ashkenazi Jewish immigrants from Belarus, doesn't simply remain, he continues to dream.

**50 years ago**, on **October 2, 1968**, President Lyndon Johnson signed the **Wild and Scenic Rivers Act** into law, representing a historic turning point in our nation's preservation ethic. This new policy of preserving rivers in their free-flowing, natural condition contrasted sharply with the dam-building and water-diversion ethos prevalent up until that time.

On **December 21, 1968, Apollo 8**, the second manned spaceflight mission in the United States Apollo space program, was launched. The three-astronaut crew — Commander Frank Borman, Command Module Pilot James Lovell, and Lunar Module Pilot William Anders — became the first humans to travel beyond low Earth orbit; see Earth as a whole planet; orbit Earth's moon; directly see the far side of the Moon with their own eyes; witness an <u>Earthrise</u>; escape the gravity of another celestial body (Earth's moon), and return safely to Earth. The 1968 mission, the third flight of the Saturn V rocket and that rocket's first crewed launch, was also the first human space launch from the Kennedy Space Center, Florida, adjacent to Cape Canaveral Air Force Station.

**Big Mac turns 50**. McDonald's is celebrating the **1968** national launch of the double-decker sandwich whose ingredients of "two all-beef patties, special sauce, lettuce, cheese, pickles, onions and a sesame seed bun" were seared into American memories by a TV jingle.

**40 years ago**, Congress passed the legislation proclaiming the first Sunday after Labor Day as National Grandparents' Day. On August 3, 1978, then-President Jimmy Carter signed the proclamation.
